Horses are not dogs and do not in the same manner but please note that this thoroughbred race horse exhibits an easy, gait and it appears that he could keep it up all day. The Basenji should give a similar appearance of light, movement; he should appear to float.

 Any Basenji who moves with a flashy gait is probably too hard.
