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BASENJI STANDARD

This we have found out to be quite a problem! How many of us have been taken on this? I understand quite a few. We paid through the nose for a qualified showable dog with no major faults. We have a beautiful tri bitch which might be stretched to 14 1/4 inches at one year of age. Two judges, after she was nine months old, have asked her age and passed her over, saying she's too small. While being shown in the 4 to 6 and 6 to 9 month classes, she did beautifully although she never won any points. We were told we bought and got a qualifying show dog. But we have a beautiful pet at a show price.

The standard should be set and if you want miniature, standard and large, they should be judged in their classes as such. Our standard says 16 inches for bitches and 17 for dogs.


Now, you breeders can not go out and buy show or breeding stock and be assured you will come close to standard. So you have money invested, so what happens when you breed. Results: More of same. Why foul up this breed like others

We want a tri male pup and would like to purchase one to the breed standard, that means dark eyes, good head, good tail set, 17 inches, even temperament. In other words, to the breed standard. Is it possible? Or do we pay for one and if it doesn't develop we pay the high price for another pet.

Some of the things we have read about Baseniis really amaze us. We have proved that Basenjis are no different than any other smart dog. They are trainable in all facets of dogdom. Now if you have a spoiled dog, don't come up with that worn out excuse, "it's a Basenji" because this is not true. . .

TELOMIAN DOGS

AN ABORIGINAL BREED FROM MALAYSIA

ORIGIN: There are reports of small yellow dogs with erect ears and curly tails in the Malay Peninsula and East Indies, which presumably could be a link between the Basenji, or African barkless dog, and the Australian Dingo. While engaged in a study of primate ecology, Orville Elliot (Temple University) had the opportunity to collect a pair of Malayan aboriginal dogs near the Telom River, Pahang State, at latitude 4° 24' 6" north and longitude 101° 43' 6" East of Greenwich, in the summer of 1963. These are general purpose dogs occasionally used for hunting, but mostly for companionship. They sleep with their masters and freely enter and leave the aborigines' huts. It is likely there are few of these dogs left in Malaya since many (according to Aborigines) were eaten by Communist terrorists and most of the remainder are hybrid offspring of aboriginal dogs and the town breeds. Increasing trade with the outside world has also contributed to the spread of European breeds into the jungle as trade goods or gifts from government agencies.

The aborigine owners realized that the breed was fast dving out and agreed to contribute their pets to a project designed to perpetuate the breed, provided the male, AHTONG, and the female, AHOING, would not be injured in experimentation or killed. The remoteness of the village in which these dogs were obtained and their general appearance made it reasonably certain that they hadn't been crossed with European breeds. The original pair of Telomian dogs was sent to the Jackson Laboratory in Bar Harbor, Maine, where three litters were obtained. Three male and eleven female descendants of the aboriginal Telomian pair are currently maintained in a breeding colony by Dr. J. P. Scott, at Bowling Green University, Bowling Green, Ohio.

APPEARANCE: The Telomian dogs have much the same general appearance as Basenjis, with erect ears, curly tails, short coat, and red or yellow coat color. The last is produced by the ay gene which produces the so-called "sable" color: red hair with black tips. In Basenjis the black tips disappear in adult dogs, leaving clear red, whereas in the Telomians this disappearance is less complete, leaving some black hair on tail and spine. Like Basenjis, the Telomians carry the gene for white spotting, s, and appear to be homozygous for this. Unlike Basenjis, the Telomians carry the dominant gene E" for a black face mask and also the dominant gene T for ticking. In general appearance the Telomians have relatively smaller ears and less prominently wrinkled foreheads than Basenjis. The head is somewhat smaller and the Telomians have more tendency to put on weight than the Basenjis when fed a standard diet of dry dog food, etc. The growth curve is very much like like that of all dogs, proceeding in essentially a straight line from four to sixteen weeks. The most interesting point about the growth pattern is that all Telomian puppies raised to ma-

turity in this country are larger than the original pair. Average adult body weight is about 40% greater for females and 50% for males. Presumably this is due to better nutrition and ad lib feeding, contrasted with the restricted, low protein diet given such animals in Malaysia.

VOCALIZATION: One of the peculiarities of Basenjis is the tendency to bark very little, usually restricted to one or two low pitched woofs. However, they growl, howl, and occasionally make a sound described as "crowing," which appears to be a modified bark. The Telomians make all these sounds and, in addition, do considerable barking in the form of a high pitched yap, much like a Cocker Spaniel.

PERFORMANCE IN TRAINING TESTS: When compared to Basenjis, Beagles, and Shelties, the first litter of Telomians ranked closest to Basenjis in training and general laboratory testing, i. e., (obedience training, "come" in two situations, leash training and sit training). Familiarization in a discrimination apparatus, and goal running to a human being in an open arena. One characteristic of Basenjis is their resistance to restraint, resulting in poor performance on leash training and sit tests; the Telomians ranked even lower than Basenjis on this sort of performance. Telomians were least similar to Basenjis in the apparatus-familiarization exper iment, not showing the fear of strange apparatus shown by most Basenjis in the Bar Harbor strain.

SOCIAL RELATIONSHIP TEST: In a handling test which measures the development of social relationships with human beings; the Telomians, like all other breeds, showed a decreasing amount of fear and avoidance behavior between five and seven weeks. However, their scores were much below the average scores for the Bar Harbor strain of Baseniis at five weeks, and the Telomians were much less wary than the Basenjis. They are like Basenjis in developing a large amount of playful fighting and biting by fifteen weeks of age, but rank much higher than Basenjis on social investigation and attraction-following scores. In general, Telomians give the impression of being like Basenjis in agressiveness, but the former are much more socially responsive and less timid.

FUTURE: It is hoped that this strain of Telomian dogs can be maintained, although the gene pool present in the two original animals is perhaps too restricted to permit continued fertility. As to general usefulness in research, these animals appear to be unusually hardy and healthy, compared with most European breeds, but are not highly fertile.

Behaviorally, they do not show the extreme variation from European breeds characteristic of Basenjis, and they would undoubtedly make attractive household pets. From the viewpoint of genetics, one of the attractive features of these aboriginal breeds which are now rapidly disappearing throughout the world is the degree of known genetic isolation from other breeds of dogs. It may be estimated that these animals have been genetically isolated from Basenjis for at least three thousand years, and perhaps longer, with considerable opportunity for genetic divergence to develop.

If a viable population is to be maintained, it would be desireable that further imports be made from the same general area before the breed becomes extinct in Malaysia, and that the size of the population be increased with the help of amateur dog breeders.

AVAILABILITY: Nine of the female Telomians maintained by Dr. J. P. Scott at Bowling Green, Ohio, have come into estrus during the interval of September 1, 1969 to October 8, 1969. This is consistent with the general pattern of seasonal breeding found in most Telomians, although the month of August saw the onset of most estrus periods in previous years, and some animals occasionally run cycles at two seasons of



the bucketful from my neighbor's house for myself and 18 dogs. I'm easy to recognize - I'm the stoop-shouldered one! I consider myself fortunate in having friends who offer the privileges of a shower now and again. The kindest thing said to me last Sunday was, "You don't smell bad!"

I regret that I must say that AM. & CAN. CH. FELLJI OF THE ZANDE who was simply called "ROOKIE JUNIOR" died on December 29 at the age of 7 from akidney malfunction. His name may be unfamiliar to most, but he did make his mark for he was the top winning Basenji in Canada in 1964 and one of the top ten hounds there at that time. He lies alongside his mother, SALLY, whose death was mentioned here only a few months ago. Odd how they seem to know the approach of the end. TELOMIAN DOGS (continued)

this year, four have been mated naturally and five have been artificially inseminated. Up to nine Telomian litters are therefore expected in November and early December, 1969.

Five of the nine expected Telomian litters will be available to dog breeders who are highly motivated to perpetuate the breed in this country. Since housing space is not available at Bowling Green for the number of litters expected, we would prefer to ship pregnant female Telomians to chosen breeders with the understanding that the mother and progeny will be used as breeding stock. If satisfactory arrangements for transfer of all five available female Telomians cannot be made before parturition, then several of the litters will be maintained temporarily in our laboratory until the puppies have reached eight weeks of age. At that time individual pups, pairs, etc., will be shipped to interested breeders under terms comparable to those which apply for registered breeds. More detailed information about individual animals, terms, and shipping can be supplied to interested parties upon request. A pedigree will be supplied for each animal, of course. Breeders should be aware that the pregnant female Telomians which we can supply, although well socialized, have been kennel reared and are unused to being off-leash or in human dwellings, cars, etc.



Ramblin' With Grannie Green

It's a bit disconcerting while writing a column about Basenjis to look up from the typewriter and see an inquisitive pair of Basenji ears, two mischievous brown eyes peeking over the back of the machine. It is to be assumed that RIHAL JACCI DEE was snooping to see if proper recognition was being given her two precocious red and white sons and her adopted tri. (Litters can be integrated, even in Mississippi.)

We experienced a near tragedy with our Christmas litter but the ending was so tender I feel it worth sharing with my readers. JACCI, with the assistance of WAMARU OF HILLS HALF ACRE, presented us with two beautiful males in early December. We'll not be able to enjoy them very long. They were spoken for many months ago.

As Christmas neared, we were eagerly anticipating a litter from our tri bitch. With the instinct that comes with years of association with dogs, I felt things were not quite right with my little girl. There was no obvious reason for my uneasiness. My capable veterinarian assured me I was overly eager for the arrival of the litter. The nearer she approached whelping date, the "nervouser" I became. You can't escape the infallibility of womanly intuition. Christmas night found us at the veterinary clinic. Had it not been for my very alert, skilled veterinarian, Dr. Wayne Adams, we'd have lost both ITTA BENA and her single whelp, a tri male. ITTA BENA made a swift recovery from her ordeal except that she had no milk for her little one. Although JACCI'S babies were getting their eyes open, my lovely girl accepted the newborn as if it were her own. (That one slipped up on me, she seemed to say.)

If any of you have entertained doubts that dogs lack maternal and emotional impulses, let me dispel the idea. ITTA BENA was devoted to her baby from the unnatural moment of his birth. She wanted so much to nurse him; we tried to help with all the means we knew. When we finally gave him to JACCI it broke her heart. Her sobbing yodels might have issued from a human throat. It has been a trying experience for all of us. We took her puppy to visit with her until we eventually decided it would be kinder to let her forget it. A dog does have feelings.

Prior to this personal incident, I had written a column for the current issue based on a reprint from the Gaines Research Center which appeared recently in "The Basenji," re-

garding owner influences on a dog's behavior. At this time, as puppies are coming into saleable age, the article has a particular import to Basenji breeders. As the Gaines report pointed out, the puppy's disposition, his adjustment to a new home. depends wholly upon the new owner. A puppy is a mimiker, for he is man's best friend. Psychologists are prone to state that a child's disposition is a reflection of one or both parents. The same is true of a puppy except that the puppy is more vulnerable to the whims and fancies of his owner. He cannot talk, therefore his only means of expression are affection, fear, anger or rebuttal.

A breeder may sell a happy, well-adjusted puppy to a home where dispositions and environment are entirely different from that of his natal home. The new owner may be overly protective, too indulgent or he may be harsh and domineering, impatient with puppy ways, too busy or too preoccupied to take the necessary time to train the newcomer. Results: a maladjusted puppy, a most unhappy owner. The fault? Circumstances.

No child is born bad, neither is a puppy. In many instances, the destructive child or puppy is pleading for attention. If he cannot get it one way, he will get it another. This is the definition of TLC (Tender Loving Care). It takes the patience of Job, the strength of Gibralter and the fortitude of our pioneer forefathers to properly train child or puppy. Love - to overlook the falls from grace, tenacity to persevere in training.

I quote the Gaines report, "a young dog is a vigorous, growing animal. His energy must have outlets other than concocting mischief. If your puppy is noisy, destructive, too aggressive, ask yourself why. Is he alone too much of the time, given too little attention or exercise? Perhaps he is relieving his boredom as best he can. Would you be surprised if a fiveyear-old child, alone in his room all day, crayoned the walls or pulled down the curtains?"

All sincere breeders hope to place puppies in homes where there will be happiness for all concerned. Sometimes we fail. New owners must realize and accept the responsibility they assume when they bring a puppy into a strange, new world. It is a period of adjustment for everyone.

At the Southern Specialty in Memphis, I learned that Tom Diener lost a Basenji he was handling in Cape Girardeau. I offered any assistance I might render through publicity. He told me he and his wife were returning to Cape Girardeau the following day to search again for the dog. He was not very hopeful since our breed is rather uncommon in that area. I had

Although the last Sunday of December is the regularly scheduled meeting date of the BCON, because of the holidays, the meeting was postponed until mid-January. Last year we held the meeting the same Sunday as the Superbowl game and it proved to be quite stiff competition. This year our December meeting will be January 18 and we hope more people will be able to attend.

We are going to do something different at the January meeting. We are having a "dog too" gathering. All members who wish, are encouraged to bring their dog(s) to the meeting. It's a good way for members to see others' dogs and also a chance to get the dogs used to each other. Since we have been holding our meetings at the Nebraska Humane Society, space is no problem. We're hoping for a good turn-out.

A situation has arisen in Omaha which is worthy of discussion. A group has been organized (mostly non-dog people) to pass a new ordinance on dog control. Among the provisions are stricter laws on strays or pet dogs running loose. This part of the proposal doesn't affect serious breeders or pet owners since responsible people keep their dogs at home. However, part of the proposed ordinance would raise the licensing fee from \$4 to \$25 for unspayed females, \$4 for males. The thought behind this is that the cost of licensing should be higher than the cost of spaying and thus encourage owners to have their bitches spayed and supposedly end the problem of loose males being attracted to bitches in season! At this point, it doesn't look as though this part of the proposal will pass without considerable compromise. Another proposal which was discussed, but thankfully it was withdrawn by this organization, was the provision to require all bitches in season to be confined at the Humane Society, a veterinary office or an approved, licensed kennel. When the hearing is held next month, we're expecting a large number of dog people to attend. Hopefully, a reasonable compromise can be reached. Another unofficial proposal of the organization was to help defray costs by selling picked-up or unclaimed dogs to research laboratories.

BASENJI CLUB OF NEW ENGLAND yankee doin's

Winter is with us in New England: one town in Vermont had 48 inches of snow, and some parts of Massachusetts had 8 inches of snow and 5 inches of rain. Many weather records were broken in this part of the country.

How do our Basenjis like this weather? One of our house dogs took one look outside during the storm when I opened the door to let her out and she looked up at me and as much as said, "Forget it!" Then went back to her crate.

This also is the time of the year to look at the results of the past year, and, of course, make plans for the future. The past year has been a very good year for Basenjis. There has been an increase in dogs being shown, bred and registered, but most important, Basenjis have had more group placings and best in show wins than any previous year. Every effort should be made to continue with this wonderful progress as the future certainly looks bright for our breed of dogs.

For the novice breeders, the tip this month is feeding new Basenji puppies. Basenji puppies' eyes open about two weeks after birth and shortly after their eyes are open, you should get started on food. The first meal I feed is a good baby formula consisting of a raw egg vold, an envelope of plain gelatin, 2 tablespoons of honey (raw preferred), a large size can of milk with half a can of water. Mix altogether and warm as used. The idea is to get some of the formula into the puppies' mouths. This can be done by putting the muzzle into the formula. Once he gets a taste you are all set. In future meals add high protein baby cereal to the mixture and at about three

and a half weeks of age, add scraped beef, scraped veal or lamb. (The scraping with a spoon avoids fat and sinew tissue that a young puppy cannot digest yet). A couple of weeks later, this scraping is no longer necessary but a good grade of chopped chuck or round can be substituted. And a good brand of puppy chow for the baby cereal. And don't forget the vitamins. We start them out with a baby vitamin, and at about 6 to 7 weeks of age, give them a good dog vitamin with minerals. And by the time they are on two meat meals and two chow meals a day, the formula is omitted, and just warm water added. Lots of luck with your new puppies.

We have had all of our annual meetings at this location and the food has been excellent. I will report the results of the meeting in next month's column.



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THE LIBYAN DOG

OMESTIC DOGS

How did they spread over the earth? No one knows exactly, but the widespread theory is that they followed man in his worldly movements. That still leaves a void as even this movement hasn't been thoroughly documented. The evolution of the domestic dog and the various species thereof has been an intriguing subject for years and will continue to grow in the years to come.

We have found in Libya, to date, three types of domestic dogs. I use the word "domestic" with great reservation as I would not use the word at all in conjunction with these dogs if I could come up with another word that better fits the bill. All three are wild and one is vicious in nature and yet all three have attached themselves to man in one form or another.



The Libyan dog is the most aggressive of the three and the hardest to study because of its viciousness. We have found these dogs in abundance from Tripoli to Leptis Magna and down to Torhuna. This area is populated by Nomadic herders and farmers, both of whom live in anything from huts of clay to tents or caves. Some are permanent residents and some travel about with the seasons. These facts are important when you consider the nature of the dogs living with these people.

A hardy breed, strong, well-fed looking, keen eyesight,

sly and showing a high degree of intelligence. They survive on what they manage to catch. Birds which are snatched from the air, rodents dug from the earth and insects make up the main diet of these dogs. A dense, harsh coat, measuring about two inches in length on the body with a bushy, foxy-type tail. White is the only color we have seen. The tail is "otter" carried and the ears are "bat" and rather low set. The dog is higher in the hips than at the shoulder with powerful hindquarters and rather weak fronts. Legs are fine boned, ending in a cat foot. Eyes and pigment are dark brown to black and we haven't seen any albinos. Weight is around 30 pounds and height at the shoulder (which, as I said, is shorter than at the hips) is about 22 inches.

I have never heard them bark, but they have never been called barkless. I am told they are very fast runners which would attest to their ability to snatch a bird in flight.

These dogs have a definite attachment to one family. They are usually seen romping with a child or running through a farmer's fields. When a family is observed walking along a road, if you will scan the surrounding hill tops, you will see the dog(s). It will sit on a hill top some distance forward of the family and as the family approaches, the dog will disappear only to appear again on another hill further down the road.

We have managed to get only one photo of this dog for several reasons: 1. The Libyan people aren't very friendly these days towards foreigners! 2. They have a religious dislike of cameras, and 3. The very viciousness of the dogs themselves.

I would liken this dog to the Jackal except for the more doggy muzzle structure. I can see absolutely no Basenji in this dog.

We have a new champion at our house too. Our little girl, BLACK-EYED SUSAN OF WOZ won her championship at South Bend, Indiana, going Best of Breed over two specials. Even more exciting than that was the fact that our six month old tri puppy (here's another judge that likes tris - Dr. Shute, of Canada), THE ECLIPER OF WOZ going Winners Dog and Best of Opposite Sex to SUZIE.

The South Bend show was especially nice as it was held in the Athletic and Convocation Center at Notre Dame University. There was ample room for benching, nice large rings and stairstep seating all around the arena. I think this would be an excellent show to consider for the Midwest Specialty.

Haere Mai From Kiwi Land

With annual holidays only days off, I can see Jack disappearing into the bush at the back where he is finishing new Basenji runs (distinguishable from 'dog runs' by the height of the fences and depth of concrete footings necessary to keep Basenjis in). He usually has MR. POLLY for company and says, "Well, I know YOU won't get out, but what do you reckon about your mates!" We have a couple of talented climbers in our gang and have learnt our lesson from past experience.

At the present we fill odd leisure hours studying dog anatomy and trotting our Basenjis individually down the driveway with the "watcher" lying prone at the far end, shouting, "Faster!" or "Slow down!" Thankfully, we are far from our nearest neighbours or they'd think we were all slightly batty. Actually, it is rather fascinating to go over such points as 'shoulder placement,' 'stifles,' etc., and then relate it to the movement of the dog. One can gradually start to realise WHY the shoulder should be well laid back, forelegs straight, and pasterns straight but flexible. This is probably very elementary to well established breeders, but new owners will find it far more interesting if they do try and see why the standard asks for these and other points. Must admit, at first, I thought they were just trying to be difficult!

In the last copy of the New Zealand Basenji Club Newsletter, Jack had an article on white markings in Basenjis which might be of interest:

"I recently read a very interesting book, 'The Inheritance of Coat Colour in Dogs,' by C.C. Little. Much of the contents do not apply to Basenjis and the book was a little out of date in that it only covered the red and whites with a brief mention of the tricolours. There was no mention of the black and whites, or the black, tan and whites.

"What I did find of great interest was a chapter dealing with the distribution of the white. Basenjis are the best example of a colour pattern known as "Irish" - it was first reported in the Irish rat! Drawings of Basenjis were used to illustrate this chapter.

"The gene which produces the white feet, tail tip, chest, etc., is carried by all Basenjis. There are, however, additional modifying factors which act with the main gene and determine how much white is produced. At one end of the scale we could have a dog with little or no white. From this there is a continuous range to the dogs with a very large proportion of white. The very plain dogs have more of the factors favouring less white, but they still carry some of the 'more white' factors.

"At either extreme, mis-markings are likely to occur, i. e., very plain dogs could be without white feet or tail tip, and at the other extreme, dogs with a great deal of white could have disfiguring streaks of white up their sides, white spots in the red, etc.

"Basenji litters can show considerable variations, but it can be stated that two very plain dogs would tend to produce fairly plain offspring. The average would be roughly the same as the parents, but there would be variations either way. Also two dogs with a great deal of white would tend to produce offspring with a great deal of white with some rather plainer, and some with even more white than their parents. However, plain dogs can crop up from parents with a great deal of white and vice versa.

"The important point to note is that mis-markings, as such, are not inherited, i.e., there is not a particular gene for plain feet. If a dog is produced without any white on his feet, there is no need to worry about his passing this on to his offspring provided he is not mated to a very plain bitch. In such a case, it would be prudent to choose a mate with ample

white. The offspring should then be 'average' in their amount of white and would be no different than 'average' dogs produced from normally marked parents. They would have no more tendency to pass on plain feet than any other Basenji.

"Also, a very white dog could have a number of white spots in the wrong places. These spots would not be produced by any particular gene, and so there is no reason to avoid using him for breeding. Once again, however, it would be prudent to choose a mate with rather less than average white.

"One point which could be mentioned here is that the amount of white on a puppy reduces considerably, particularly over the first few months. This means that small white spots will disappear, and that plain dogs will get even plainer.

"It is possible (and here I admit I am guessing - I have no figures to prove it), that the dam may have a greater influence on the amount of white than the sire does. Both, of course, pass on exactly equal influences genetically, but from the time of conception the dam provides the environment in which the puppies develop. This environment is important as no gene can develop its full effect unless it has a favourable climate. There is a similarity here with the Himalayan rabbit which normally has white at the extremities, i.e., feet, etc. If his feet are kept warm by wearing mittens they turn brown. The reason for this is that the development of the pigment is very dependent on the temperature. It is also possible to produce white patterns elsewhere on the body by artificially cooling the area. I would not suggest that mittens on a Basenji would turn his feet brown, but it is quite possible that the environment before birth could have some effect!"

There is a total entry of 2,611 dogs of 121 breeds and varieties entered in Westminster Kennel Club show, February 9th and 10th, and 60 percent of the dogs entered are champions.

I wonder if any of you breeders have given any thought to the results of use of various shots and drugs that are being given to dogs and bitches to either increase fertility or postponing the bitch's coming in season. Over the years we seem to have become "shot happy" and often with undesireable after affects. I know of several bitches that have had to be spayed as the result of infection that was evidently caused by a shot to prevent their coming in season. Also recently a bitch out west whelped six puppies, all of which were double sexed (both internal and external) and had to be destroyed. This bitch had failed to conceive after several matings and was given fertility (hormone) injections. I have also heard of males who have gone

sterile after producing sound, good puppies, and after hormone injections were able to produce again, but the litters sired were small, not uniform and with abnormalities present in most litters. Could hormone be the culprit? Most veterinarians

My veterinarian has another theory. It's this: There was something wrong with the dog or bitch (either an infection of some kind, or something else) that caused sterility in the first place and therefore was nature's way of preventing reproduction, however, the shots brought it on and, in essence, forced nature to do what was not normal, therefore the resulting abnormalities. I feel we should be aware of the above when deciding to use shots to aid in breeding. I am sure we'd rather have no pups at all than to have an abnormal one. Give it some thought. This needs further scientific study. Remember the Thalidomide? Even birth control pills have some bad side affects in some cases. Think about it!

When I met her she had one bitch. HAKU BLACK MISCHIEF, and a young tri male from Veronica, BLACK MINT OF THE CONGO. He was the first proper tri color in Wisconsin and became a champion.

Dr. Gerry's home was a lovely huge home in Shorewood Hills - and I found the most remarkable item in the house - portable chain link runs, including one in the bedroom. Her young dogs were not crated, but had the inside runs to keep them in during the night, and bitches in season were also in inside runs so not to upset the neighborhood dogs. House, runs and yards were immaculate - and her dogs were scientifically fed and in perfect condition at all times. 


